





Welcoming Address

The transition to a free society is the most relevant challenge for citizens of the former so called socialist countries with communist regimes in Central and Eastern Europe. These societies have abandoned political systems based on a constitutionally quaranteed leading position for one political multiparty political systems which were established after free elections in 1989 and 1990. This has, however, been only the first step in getting over the consequences of the rule of totalitarianism in these countries. Totalitarianism overwhelmed all branches of a human activity. During its rule were destroyed democratic institutions, the real rule of a law, and changed the role of the market and the system of property rights. These ideologically justified changes, together with the arbitary formation of institutions designed for central management of the economy, threw the societies into Serfdom in the Hayekian sense. This condition alone causes social development to slow down or even to stop, as well as macroeconomic disequilibria, inefficient production, and loss of competitiveness of firms in the world market. The task of building democratic societies in these countries which led voters to give their votes to the political parties which won the last elections, is unrealizable without substantial economic changes. Political changes in the late eighties and early ninties, which happened so fast, were only the preconditions for constitutional and legal changes happening just now, which create the legal framework for real economic changes toward Freedom and Prosperity. Future wealth of an possible only by means nation is individuals, fully responsible for their acts. From this point of view, the privatization of wholly state owned economies is the precondition for substantial change in the development of macroeconomic indicators. Changing these indicators will require

a long period, even in the case of radical economic reform based restrictive monetary policy, the speediest means of inner convertibility initially the of inconvertible currencies as a step towards full convertibility, and the liberalization of foreign trade. The demand for the so called gradual method of economic reform pushed by former reform communists and still by perestroika inclined intellectuals is politically very dangerous. By means of populistic slogans and declarations they are trying to delay and postpone radical economic transformation and its visible positive results. Their goal is evident. They would like to achieve victory in the following elections, to restore their "privileged" position and manage society as only socialist intellectuals are capable. It would be moral hazzard to enable them their interest and to protect the newly liberated nations of Central and Eastern Europe to follow the speediest way to their real Freedom and Wealth.

The Prague Mont Pelerin Society Meeting 1991 is expected to provide a forum for discussing and analyzing the unprecedented process of transition from Communist Totalitarism to a Free Society. This process has not been satisfactorilly described in any textbook. In this respect there is a historical opportunity for the Mont Pelerin Society to contribute to the process ef understanding and explanation of the very complicated, overwhelming process of transition. On its successful progress and management depend the fates of millions from the excommunist countries as well as the fate of Europe as a whole.

The excellent idea of organizing the MPS meeting in Czechoslovakia, a country 'until quite recently behind "the iron curtain", demonstrates that former barriers in Europe have been already destructed. The father of this idea was Dr. Max Thurn. He, unfortunatelly, is no longer among us. Till his last days he worked very hard for the success of the Mont Pelerin Society

Meeting in Prague. This conference was intended to be one of many necessary events on our road to the community of democratic nations. To this aim and to the memory of Dr. Max Thurn the organizing committee of the MPS Regional Meeting 1991 in Prague will undertake everything necessary for its success.
